Who is SADO?

SADO is the only state-funded and statewide public defender office in Michigan. We represent and oversee the representation of indigent individuals appealing their felony convictions and sentences.

How Can SADO Help Families?

It can be a scary and confusing time when your loved one is convicted of a crime and sentenced to the Michigan Department of Corrections (MDOC).

SADO invites anyone affected by incarceration to join us for a free informational session about what to expect after a loved one has been convicted and sentenced to prison.

Attendees of this informational session can talk with SADO staff about the process of appealing a conviction and how an appeal is different from the trial or plea. Attendees will also learn how to stay connected with incarcerated loved ones through visits and letters, and will learn about various resources related to incarceration.

Specifics of an individual's case will not be discussed at these sessions and legal advice will not be given. These sessions are intended to be informational only.
